Arnold: Prelude, Siciliano, and Rondo

This work was first written in 1963 for brass band under the title *Little Suite for Brass*. Paynter's arrangement for wind bands includes woodwinds and additional percussion but retains the breezy effervescence of the original work. All three movements are written in short, clear, five-part song forms. The A-B-A-C-A is instantly apparent to the listener while giving the composer's imaginative melodies a natural, almost folklike, settings. The *Prelude* begins bombastically in a fanfare style but reaches a middle climax and winds down to a quiet return of the opening measures, which fade to silence. The liltingly expressive *Siciliano* is both slower and more expressive than the other movements, thus allowing solo instruments and smaller choirs of sound to be heard. It also ends quietly. The rollicking five-part *Rondo* provides a romping finale in which the technical facility of the modern wind band is set forth in boastful brilliance.

Copland: Variations on a Shaker Melody

One of Aaron Copland's most recognized works, *Variations on a Shaker Melody* is an excerpt from his Pulitzer Prize winning ballet, *Appalachian Spring* (1944). This setting for concert band was completed by the composer during 1956 and premiered at Northwestern University on March 2, 1958. Copland selected the then obscure Shaker tune *Simple Gifts* for his variations. The unsung text, "Tis the gift to be simple, tis the gift to be free," was also relevant to the ballet's larger themes of peace, war, remembrance, and national identity.

Hanson: Chorale and Alleluia

Chorale and Alleluia was completed in January 1954, and was Dr. Hanson's first work for symphonic band. It was given its premiere on February 26th at the convention of the American Bandmasters Association at West Point with Colonel William Santelmann, leader of the U.S. Marine Band, conducting.

The composition opens with a flowing chorale. Soon the joyous *Alleluia* theme appears and is much in evidence throughout. A bold statement of a new melody makes its appearance in lower brasses in combination with the above themes. The effect is one of cathedral bells, religious exaltation, solemnity, and dignity. The music is impressive,

straightforward, and pleasingly non-dissonant, and its resonance and sonority are ideally suited to the medium of the modern symphonic band.

Vaughan Williams: Sea Songs

Written in 1923 for the following year's Wembley Exhibition, *Sea Songs* is a march medley of three well-known sea shanties: Princess Royal, Admiral Benbow, and Portsmouth. Written in typical march form with a trio, it was published simultaneously for brass band and wind band, and was later transcribed by the composer for symphony orchestra. It should be noted that *Sea Songs* was originally intended to be the final movement of Vaughan Williams's *Folk Song Suite*.

Chance: Variations on a Korean Folk Song

Variations on a Korean Folk Song is based upon a folk tune that the composer learned while serving the U.S. Army in Seoul, Korea. The tune is known as *Arrirang*, a song of love and heartbreak that can be found in many variations, with an origin that may date back 1000 years. In autumn 1966, for the Journal of Band Research, Chance said: "I became acquainted with the folk song while serving in Seoul, Korea, as a member of the Eighth U.S. Army Band in 1958-59. The tune is not as simple as it sounds, and my fascination with it during the intervening years led to its eventual use as the theme for this set of variations."

Grainger: Irish Tune from County Derry

For the following beautiful air I have to express my very grateful acknowledgment to Miss J. Ross, of N.-T.-Limavady, in the county of Londonderry – a lady who has made a large collection of the popular unpublished melodies of that county, which she has very kindly placed at my disposal, and which has added very considerably to the stock of tunes which I had previously acquired from that still very Irish county. I say still very Irish, for though it has been planted for more than two centuries by English and Scottish settlers, the old Irish race still forms the great majority of its peasant

inhabitants; and there are few, if any, counties in which, with less foreign admixture, the ancient melodies of the country have been so extensively preserved. The name of the tune unfortunately was not ascertained by Miss Ross, who sent it to me with the simple remark that it was "very old," in the correctness of which statement I have no hesitation in expressing my perfect concurrence.

Williams: Strategic Air Command March

The Strategic Air Command March was written as a tribute to the United States Strategic Air Command (headquartered at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska) at the request of Herman G. Vincent, commander of the SAC Bands. According to Vincent, Williams didn't need much persuading – the two musicians had been friends at Louisiana State University, and Williams had served his World War II military time in a U.S. Air Force band. The march was premiered at the SAC Band's annual concert in Omaha, Nebraska, on July 14, 1963, and was conducted by the composer.

Near the end of the march the "sonic booms" remind the listeners of the Strategic Air Command's mission of eternal vigilance.
