Frank Ticheli: Blue Shades



In 1996, MCC Director of Bands and Waco Community Band Music Director, Dr. James Popejoy and the Waco Community Band proudly commissioned Ticheli to compose *Blue Shades* as part of a consortium of thirty university, community, and high school concert bands under the auspices of the Worldwide Concurrent Premieres and Commissioning Fund.

The composer writes, "Four years, and several compositions later, I finally took the opportunity to realize that need by composing *Blue Shades*. As its title suggests, the work alludes to the blues, and a jazz feeling is prevalent – however, it is not literally a blues piece. There is not a single 12-bar blues progression to be found,

and except for a few isolated sections, the eighth-note is not swung. The work, however, is heavily influenced by the blues: "Blue notes" (flatted 3rds, 5ths, and 7ths) are used constantly; blues harmonies, rhythms, and melodic idioms pervade the work; and many "shades of blue" are depicted, from bright blue, to dark, to dirty, to hot blue. At times, *Blue Shades* burlesques some of the clichés from the Big Band era, not as a mockery of those conventions, but as a tribute. A slow and quiet middle section recalls the atmosphere of a dark, smoky blues haunt. An extended clarinet solo played near the end recalls Benny Goodman's hot playing style, and ushers in a series of "wailing" brass chords recalling the train whistle effects commonly used during that era."

San Antonio native Frank Ticheli is an American composer and conductor. Ticheli joined the faculty of the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music in 1991, where he is Professor of Composition. From 1991 to 1998, Ticheli was Composer in Residence of the Pacific Symphony, and he still enjoys a close working relationship with that orchestra and their music director, Carl St. Clair.

Ticheli is well known for his works for concert band, many of which have become standards in the repertoire. In addition to composing, he has appeared as guest conductor of his music at Carnegie Hall, at many American universities and music festivals, and in cities throughout the world, including Schladming, Austria, at the Mid-Europe Music Festival; London and Manchester, England, with the Meadows Wind Ensemble; Singapore, with the Singapore Armed Forces Central Band; and numerous cities in Japan, with the Bands of America National Honor Band.

Frank Ticheli is the winner of the 2006 NBA/William D. Revelli Memorial Band Composition Contest for his *Symphony No. 2*. Other awards for his music include the Charles Ives and the Goddard Lieberson Awards, both from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the Walter Beeler Memorial Prize, and First Prize awards in the Texas Sesquicentennial Orchestral Composition Competition, Britten-on-the-Bay Choral Composition Contest, and Virginia CBDNA Symposium for New Band Music.





Douglas, the capital of the Isle of Man, was a holiday mecca in Victorian times for people from Northern England. Even before Haydn Wood was born, his family had regularly journeyed there from Slaithwaite, Yorkshire. At the beginning of the 1885 tourist season, Haydn's elder brother Harry was hired as leader and soloist of the large orchestra at the Falcon Cliff Castle in Douglas. That summer, Sabra Wood brought the entire family, including her little son Haydn, age 3, to proudly watch and listen to Harry and the orchestra. From the age of 7, Haydn studied the violin with Harry. He loved being a member of Harry's Students Orchestra and performed regularly on the Isle of Man.

By the late 1920s, Haydn Wood was becoming known as a conductor of his own music, and he conducted concerts at the Palace from then and throughout the 1930s. On June 19, 1927, in a huge Manx (the common demonym for the Isle of Man) Celtic Concert in which Harry was greatly involved, he conducted the Palace Orchestra in *A Health to All Who Cross the Main* for baritone, chorus and orchestra, with lyrics by Manxman Henry Hanby Hay, which he had composed expressly for the Manx Homecoming Celebration.

It was not until 1931 that Haydn Wood started composing his large-scale Manx orchestral pieces. The first of these to be played in Douglas was *Mannin Veen*, on July 9, 1933, conducted by the composer in an exciting concert which included the second and third movements of his new *Concerto for Violin*, performed by the Spanish violinist Antonio Brosa with the Palace Grand Orchestra. *Mannin Veen* was eventually published in 1937 and is a classic band work of the post-Holst, pre-Hindemith era of band works; it draws on the composer's experiences of Manx culture when his family lived on the Isle of Man, this autonomous island situated between Ireland and the English mainland in the Irish Sea. The composition exhibits both symphonic grandeur and Celtic tunefulness, often featuring the principal clarinet.

On the occasion of the first BBC broadcast in February 1933 of *Mannin Veg Veen*, Haydn Wood was quoted as saying to the Isle of Man Times: "The critics were struck by the beauty of the national airs. I feel very proud and gratified that our tunes are so appreciated ... It was my original intention to call the work *Mannin Veg Veen* (Dear Little Isle of Man) but I found that people would insist on pronouncing 'veg' as a waiter does in a cheap restaurant when he bawls down the lift for 'meat and a couple of veg.' I decided to abandon the 'potatoes and peas' portion of the title."

John Williams: Escapades



The 2002 film Catch Me If You Can constituted a delightful departure for director Steven Spielberg. It tells the story of Frank Abagnale, the teenage imposter, who baffled FBI agents with his incredible exploits. The film is set in the now nostalgically-tinged 1960s, and so it seemed to me that I might evoke the atmosphere of that time by writing a sort of impressionistic memoir of the progressive jazz movement that was then so popular. The alto saxophone seemed the ideal vehicle for this expression, and the three-

movement suite, *Escapades*, is the result. In "Closing In," we have music that relates to the often humorous sleuthing which took place in a story, followed by "Reflections," which refers to the fragile relationships in Abagnale's broken family. Finally, in "Joy Ride," we have the music that accompanied Frank's wild flights of fantasy that took him all around the world before the law finally reigned him in."

In a career spanning more than six decades, John Williams has become one of America's most accomplished and successful composers for both film and the concert stage. He has served as music director and conductor laureate of one of the country's treasured musical institutions, the Boston Pops Orchestra, and he maintains thriving artistic relationships with many of the world's great orchestras, including the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Williams has received a variety of prestigious awards, including the National Medal of Arts, the Kennedy Center Honors, the Olympic Order, and numerous Academy Awards, Grammy Awards, Emmy Awards, and Golden Globe Awards. He remains one of our nation's most distinguished and contributive musical voices.

Williams has composed the music and served as music director for more than 100 motion pictures. His forty-six-year artistic partnership with director Steven Spielberg has resulted in many of Hollywood's most acclaimed and successful films, including Schindler's List, E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, Jaws, Jurassic Park, Close Encounters of the Third Kind, the Indiana Jones films, Saving Private Ryan, Amistad, Munich, Hook, Catch Me If You Can, Minority Report, A.I. Artificial Intelligence, Empire of the Sun, The Adventures of TinTin, War Horse, The BFG, and Lincoln. Their most recent collaboration, The Post, was released in December of 2017. Additionally, Williams composed the scores for all nine Star Wars films, the first three Harry Potter films, Superman, JFK, Born on the Fourth of July, Memoirs of a Geisha, Far and Away, The Accidental Tourist, Home Alone, Nixon, The Patriot, Angela's Ashes, Seven Years in Tibet, The Witches of Eastwick, Rosewood, Sleepers, Sabrina, Presumed Innocent, The Cowboys, The Reivers, and Goodbye, Mr. Chips, among many others. He has worked with many legendary directors, including Alfred Hitchcock, William Wyler, and Robert Altman. Williams has appeared on recordings as a pianist and conductor with Itzhak Perlman, Joshua Bell, Jessye Norman, and others. He has received five Academy Awards from fifty-two nominations, making him the Academy's most-nominated living person and the second-most nominated person in the history of the Oscars. Williams' most recent nomination was for the film Star Wars: The Rise of Skywalker. He also has received seven British Academy Awards (BAFTA), twenty-five Grammys, four Golden Globes, five Emmys, and numerous gold and platinum records.

Tim Grace, Alto Saxophone Soloist

Tim Grace is currently Head Band Director for McGregor ISD where he has led and inspired student participation in instrumental groups for seventeen years. Bands at McGregor have consistently achieved superior ratings in UIL and festival competitions and have ranked high in TMEA and ATTSB state competitions. Many McGregor music students have also placed at the state level in both UIL solo and ensemble and TMEA auditions.

Grace's music education started right here in Waco. He studied piano with Erlene Ousley and was a participant in Piano Guild and TMTA student affiliate. He studied saxophone under WCB flautist, Mary Kuhl. He was a member of the Tennyson JH band led by WCB trombonist, Mark Geary. He was also a founding member of the Polka Teens, led by Harold Strand.

Grace is an active member of TMEA, ATSSB, and TMAA as well as a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia and Phi Beta Kappa Academic Honor Society.

Grace lives in Waco with his wife of 26 years, Melissa. They have three beautiful children Patrick, Elizabeth, and Jacob who are all accomplished musicians. The family enjoys all forms of tabletop games and anything "nerd" related such as sci-fi and fantasy movies.

About the Waco Community Band

Organized in 1981 by Roger Rush, the Waco Community Band consists of amateur and professional musicians from throughout Central Texas and is sponsored by McLennan Community College. The band rehearses weekly and performs frequent concerts each year during its eleven-month season.
