### Markowski: joyRiDE



joyRiDE drew inspiration from an earlier period in my life. In the summer of 2005, I was on stage at Carnegie Hall in New York City playing alto saxophone as a senior in my high school band. When my band director, Jon Gomez, first received word that our high school music department was selected to perform in New York, he asked me if I'd like to write something to open the concert and commemorate the trip –something that was bursting with joy. "Maybe," he suggested, "it would be cool to take something more traditional, like Beethoven's

Ode to Joy, and blend it with something more modern, like John Adams." The idea was so simple and so astounding that the assignment excited me immediately – it excited me so much that within ten days, I had completed the first complete draft of *joyRiDE*, a two-and-a-half-minute concert opener that borrows Beethoven's infamous melody and dresses it in a tie-dye blazer of rhythm and texture that nod humbly to John Adams's *Short Ride on a Fast Machine*.

### Page: Fair Winds and Following Seas



Sometimes a sailor embodies two rare things coming together: the accomplishment of great voyages at sea, and the ability to write about them. But these sailor-writers reaffirm the role of the sea in our consciousness as a place of trial and courage, of honor and inspiration, and most of all, as the last great setting of untrammeled human freedom.

I have always loved the ocean and stories of adventure at sea since from a very young age. Fair Winds and Following Seas comes from the inspiration of stories about tall ships on the high seas, stories from Richard Dana, Herman Melville, Joseph Conrad, and John Kretschmer.

In the opening theme, you can hear the call to the ship that majestically sits at port. Trumpets and French Horns announce this theme as it progresses to the wonderment of the great vessel. The second theme picks up in tempo and moves to a 6/8 rhythm. The third theme slows to a flute solo in a section that stirs reflection...evoking the imagery of a starry night before returning to "full wind" and sailing the Tradewinds. The final theme is carried by the low brass in a coda-like section that represents the

spiritual side of being at sea on a great voyage. The hymn like quality of the low brass is layered under a flurry of woodwinds, which lead to an exciting new harbor.

I want to graciously thank Jon Conrad and the Waco Community Band for granting the opportunity to premier this composition. As a composer, it is a great encouragement to have such a quality ensemble perform my work...thank you all! So let the voyage go on for as long as possible; Fair Winds and Following Seas will be your companion along the way.

### Kosma: Autumn Leaves



Few would guess that this well-known melody is the creation of Joseph Kosma, a relatively obscure Hungarian composer, but such is the case. Appearing in 1945 under the title *Hulló levelek* (Falling Leaves), the tune encapsulates the feelings of despair in war-ravaged Europe, as people struggled to make sense of the destruction of civilization that had been left to them. With a French lyric by Jacques Prévert, *Les Feuilles Mortes* (The Dead Leaves), the song appeared in the 1946 film *Les Portes de la nuit*.

In 1947 when Johnny Mercer wrote the English lyric *Autumn Leaves*, the path to immortality was secure and innumerable recordings were made. In 1955, pianist Roger Williams recorded a rendition for solo piano which remains the only piano instrumental to ever reach No. 1 on Billboard's popular music chart; it sold over two million copies and was awarded a gold disc. Williams' solo piano recording is famous for Williams' descending scales and arpeggios, depicting the leaves falling from the trees to the ground below

Autumn Leaves is in AABC form. The melody remains popular with jazz musicians as the chord progressions consist almost entirely of ii-V-i sequences typical in jazz.

## Vaughan Williams: Sea Songs



Written in 1923 for the following year's Wembley Exhibition, *Sea Songs* is a march medley of three well-known sea shanties: Princess Royal, Admiral Benbow, and Portsmouth. Written in typical march form with a trio, it was published simultaneously for brass band and wind band, and was later transcribed by the composer for symphony orchestra. It should be noted that *Sea Songs* was originally intended to be the final movement of Vaughan Williams's *Folk Song Suite*.

### Grainger: Children's March



Children's March: "Over the Hills and Far Away" holds a special place in the composer's works for band. Children's March was not his first original work for wind band, for that honor goes to Lads of Wamphray March. Nor is it the first published work for wind band for Irish Tune from County Derry and Shepherd's Hey appeared in 1918.

Children's March is the first composition of his maturity originally composed and scored for wind band and, indeed, one of his few

compositions that does not exist in any full-length version suitable for performances by symphony orchestra. In contrast to many of Grainger's other compositions, the march was provided with no program notes. The score bears the dedication "For my playmate beyond the hills," which is understood by many Grainger scholars to reference Karen Holton, who shared a lengthy relationship with him during the first decade of the twentieth century. With instrumental demands unlike any band work before its time and few since, and with matching technical challenges made to the entire performing ensemble, Percy Grainger's *Children's March* remains one of the most original and satisfying parts of the wind band essential repertoire.

## **Broughton: Silverado**



Silverado is the title theme to the 1985 American-Western film, Silverado. The soundtrack to the movie was nominated for an Oscar at the Academy Awards that year. The piece opens with a "martial and majestic" horn fanfare. In traditional symphonic overture form, the middle section features several solos before the trombone signals the return for the closing section. The original melody is reprised by brass choir in augmentation as the woodwinds and keyboard percussion drive the energy to the finale.

### About the Waco Community Band

Organized in 1981 by Roger Rush, the Waco Community Band consists of amateur and professional musicians from throughout Central Texas and is sponsored by McLennan Community College. The band rehearses weekly and performs frequent concerts each year during its eleven-month season.
